A collection of 22 stories from people whose lives have been shattered by violence, tragedy and injustice and who have chosen to take the challenging and often painful journey towards forgiveness.

The exhibition's subjects include:

- Eva Kor - a survivor of the medical experiments carried out by Dr Josef Mengele in Auschwitz
- Pat Magee - the man behind the IRA Brighton bomb and Jo Berry whose father was killed in the blast
- Linda Biehl – whose daughter was killed in South Africa and now works alongside her daughter's killers
- Andrew Rice – his brother David was killed in the World Trade Center bombing
- Gill Hicks – a survivor of the 7 July 2005 bombings on the London Underground system

The Forgiveness Project encourages and empowers people to explore the nature of forgiveness and alternatives to revenge. As a charity it works in prisons, schools, faith communities, and with any group who wants to explore the nature of forgiveness.
